SPEAKER

ROBERT G. TEMPLIN, JR.
Senior Fellow, Morino Institute

Robert G. Templin, Jr. is no stranger to Piedmont Virginia Community College. Dean of instruction from 1978 to 1986, he encouraged major initiatives in international and general education. His visit to the offices of the National Endowment for the Humanities in 1985 led to a grant which enhanced the humanities program at PVCC, ultimately bringing national attention to the college.

Following his tenure at PVCC, Dr. Templin was named president of Thomas Nelson Community College in Hampton, a position he held for eight years before becoming the president of Virginia's Center for Innovative Technology. The Center for Innovative Technology was created by the General Assembly in 1984 to promote economic growth in the Commonwealth by attracting and retaining technology-based jobs and businesses and by enhancing Virginia business competitiveness through technology innovation.

As president of the center, Dr. Templin concentrated on facilitating the development and transfer of technology resources to stimulate economic development in Virginia. His efforts in workforce training, education, and economic development have been featured in publications including *Virginia Business*, *The Washington Post*, and *Fortune*. In 1997, he was selected by *Virginia Business* as "Business Newsmaker of the Year" and he received leadership in technology awards from the Northern Virginia Technology Council and the Greater Richmond Technology Council. More recently, he was named by *Digital South* magazine as one of the top 50 influential technology leaders in the region.

Dr. Templin serves on a number of boards including Virginia's A. L. Philpott Manufacturing Partnership, Virginia Business Higher Education Council, Virginia Commercial Space Flight Authority, Virginia Tech Economic Development Advisory Board, Manufacturing Technology Center Board, and several technology councils.

Dr. Templin in April joined the Morino Institute in Reston, Virginia, as a senior fellow. In this position, he is continuing an emphasis on technology. In particular, he is looking at the implications of the Internet on society, especially on youth.

SPEAKER FOR THE GRADUATES

BARBARA ANN HATCHER

*Associate in Applied Science, Computer Information Systems

Barbara Ann Hatcher today receives an associate in applied science degree in computer information technology. She is graduating with highest academic honors.

Ms. Hatcher was born in New Jersey but moved as a young child with her family to the Shenandoah Valley. In 1992, she moved across the mountain to Charlottesville, supporting herself with various retail positions and by working in a dry cleaners. When she came to PVCC in the fall of 1996, it was with the intention of taking a computer class or two to enhance her opportunities in the workplace.

But her stay at the college was to offer more breadth and length than she ever imagined. What started out as a computer class or two turned into a degree in computer information technology. What started as a position in the college's work-study program turned into a part-time classified staff position in the Jessup Library in March 1977.

In addition, Ms. Hatcher found at PVCC an environment in which her interests flourished. A self-motivated student, she has taken advantage of programs and activities at the college to expand her horizons in theater, reading, photography, and the study of diverse cultures.

Ms. Hatcher plans to continue at the college for the next year, completing a second degree in business administration. She then looks forward to studying for a bachelor's degree in information technology and a master's degree in library science.

In the audience today are members of Ms. Hatcher's family from New Jersey and Virginia. Their applause is the warm-up for further graduations to come.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENT

RONALD B. HEAD

Executive Director, Division of Planning and Technology

Ronald B. Head, executive director of the Division of Planning and Technology, is recognized for his willingness to undertake difficult tasks and complete them with great skill. So great is his modesty and his ability, that many of these tasks are smoothly completed without fanfare. The Distinguished Service Award publicly states that the college community values his quiet competence.

Thanks to his work at the college since 1985, we know more about the students we serve and the outcomes of their study here. And we know more about the college's impact in the community. More recently, we are learning to navigate the Internet and to realize the tremendous potential of the computers on our desks.

Under unusual circumstances, Dr. Head has stepped forward to assume major leadership positions at the college. In 1996, he served for five months as acting dean of instruction and student services. Last summer, he was thrust into the unanticipated role of co-director of the college's self-study for reaccreditation by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Dr. Head was coordinator and then director of institutional research and planning before his stint as acting dean. He continues to pursue his research interests and is president-elect of the Southern Association for Community College Research. As acting dean, he used his research background to develop a model for assessing instructional program productivity. As executive director of planning and information technology, he has coordinated the upgrading of all personal computers at the college, directed the installation of a high-speed local access network connected to a statewide ATM network, created a computer help desk for faculty and staff, and instituted faculty and staff training.

Dr. Head has a bachelor's degree in English from Washington & Lee University, a master's degree in English from the University of Virginia, and a doctorate in higher education from the University of Virginia. His wide range of experience was recently recognized when he was appointed to the Joint Commission of Accountability Reporting, a national group studying accountability measures in American higher education.

DISTINGUISHED STUDENT AWARD RECIPIENT

ZENO LANTOS

Associate in Art, Liberal Arts

Summa cum laude

Zeno Lantos, a member of today's graduating class, embodies the best qualities of a student. He shines in academics, drawing high praise from his professors. They remark on the caliber of his intellect and his creativity and sensitivity. "I see few students with the abiding appreciation and zeal for education which Zeno embodies," wrote one professor.

But his achievements are not limited to the classroom. In the spring of 1998 he overcame his nervousness and successfully tried out for a part in a campus theater production, working long hours to understand his character and the nuances of the script. He was chosen by his peers to be president of the college's Alpha Epsilon Tau chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, the national honor society for two-year colleges. He also was the college's nominee to the 1999 All-USA Community College Academic Team. Nominees for this honor must demonstrate a high level of academic skill, a spirit of service, and articulation of career goals.

His outstanding academic achievements, including his graduation today with highest academic honor, becomes an even greater feat when another factor is considered—English is not his first language. Mr. Lantos was born and grew up in Hungary and came to this country only recently as a high school exchange student. His culture has been an important part of his service learning. Children at The Peabody School now know more about Hungarian culture thanks to his regular visits there. They also appreciate him for the kindness and respect he shows them.

In addition to service learning, Mr. Lantos has volunteered as a worker assistant with Habitat for Humanity, as a helper at the Madison Shelter of the SPCA, and as a driver with the Madison County Rescue Squad.

On leaving PVCC, Mr. Lantos anticipates that his next step will be the University of Virginia for study of political science and foreign affairs. After obtaining an international law degree, he plans a career in government and politics.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

SIDNEY M. (MACK) TATE
Associate in Science, Education
Cum laude, Class of 1975

Sidney M. (Mack) Tate, who graduated from Piedmont Virginia Community College in 1975, is honored today as the first recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award established by the PVCC Alumni Association. The award recognizes personal or professional accomplishments of PVCC alumni. It was created to call public attention to the significant roles PVCC alumni are playing in Central Virginia communities and beyond.

Mr. Tate, principal of B.F. Yancey Elementary School in southern Albemarle County, is recognized for his service as an educator in Albemarle County and for his commitment to public education. He began his career in 1977 teaching fifth grade at Stone Robinson Elementary School and was a teacher for five years before his appointment as assistant principal at Jackson P. Burley Middle School. From 1986-91, he worked in the central office of Albemarle County Schools. He has been principal at Yancey since 1991.

What distinguishes Mr. Tate as an educator is his strong belief that schools should be an important part of the communities they serve. "At Yancey," he writes, "I have worked towards providing services to our students other than what happens during the school day. This includes services to our families and other adults in the community." As a result, Yancey is the center for many community activities and services, from evening classes for adults and children to summer programs for students, from Habitat for Humanity to a program that provides computers for home use.

All of this occurs without taking away from the fundamental commitment to instruction. In fact, youngsters at Yancey have a role model for lifelong learning in their principal. Mr. Tate received a B.S. in elementary education from the University of Virginia in 1977 and an M.S. in administration and supervision from UVa four years later. Since that time he has continued to take classes, amassing 42 graduate hours beyond the master's degree.

As a student at PVCC, Mr. Tate was active in student government and was selected to be speaker for the graduates in the Class of 1975.

THE ACADEMIC REGALIA

The history of academic dress reaches back to medieval universities, where the gown, the cap, and the hood signified the privileges and responsibilities of the scholar. The teaching guild was the guild of the master of arts; the bachelor was the apprentice of the master.

At Cambridge and Oxford universities, every detail of academic dress is subject to regulation by the university. At one time, Oxford tailors who did not comply with the rules could be punished by the vice chancellor of the university. European universities continue to show great diversity in academic dress. American colleges and universities, however, have followed a single standard of academic dress since 1895.

The gown has become a symbol of the democracy of scholarship as it covers dress indicating rank or social standing. Bachelor's and master's degree gowns have no trimming; the doctor's degree gown is faced with velvet and has velvet bars on the sleeves in colors to show the faculty or discipline to which the degree pertains.

The cap symbolizes freedom of scholarship. The symbol derives from Roman times when freed slaves had the privilege of wearing a cap. Academic caps feature a tassel indicating the discipline of the wearer.

The hood is the forerunner to the present cap. Its colors denote the discipline represented by the degree, and the college or university from which the degree was granted.

THE CEREMONIAL MACE

The Piedmont Virginia Community College mace was presented to the college by University of Virginia President Robert M. O'Neil in 1988. The gift honored PVCC President George B. Vaughan as he prepared to leave the college and also signified the close working relationship that had developed between the two institutions.

The mace is a traditional ceremonial staff which serves as a symbol of authority. The PVCC mace is made of silver and walnut and incorporates a Jefferson cup into its design. It was created by John J. Owen, retired vice president for development at the University of Virginia.
