SPEAKER

ROGER L. GREGORY

Judge, U.S. Court of Appeals, Fourth Circuit

Judge Roger L. Gregory, the first African-American judge on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit, is a real-life example of the power of education to release talents and to prepare students for successful careers and fulfilling lives.

The first of his family to graduate from high school, Judge Gregory was born in Philadelphia but grew up in Petersburg. He received a bachelor's degree with highest academic honors from Virginia State University and obtained his law degree at the University of Michigan. He is a member of Alpha Mu Gamma National Foreign Language Honor Society and Alpha Kappa Mu National Honor Society.

Judge Gregory had served as managing partner with former Gov. L. Douglas Wilder in the Wilder & Gregory Law Firm in Richmond before his appointment by President Clinton in December. In January, he was sworn in as a judge for the Richmond-based court in a ceremony at the federal court in Charlottesville.

Judge Gregory is a member of the state bars of Michigan and Virginia, past president of the Old Dominion Bar Association, a fellow of the Virginia Law Foundation, and a former board member of the Virginia Association of Defense Attorneys.

His civic activities include the Christian Children's Fund, Richmond Renaissance, and the Industrial Development Authority of Richmond. He is a past rector and member of the board of visitors of Virginia Commonwealth University, and a past member of the board of visitors of Virginia State University.

Judge Gregory is a member of the Good Shepherd Baptist Church in Petersburg and in 1997 received a humanitarian award from the National Conference of Christians and Jews. He and his wife, the former Carla Lewis, are the parents of three daughters.

GREGORY J.C. GSTATTENBAUER
Associate in Science, Science (Engineering)

Gregory J.C. Gstattenbauer today receives an associate in science degree in science with an engineering specialty.

Mr. Gstattenbauer is a 1999 graduate of Western Albemarle High School. Although he was accepted by Virginia Tech for enrollment that fall, he chose instead to come to PVCC because he felt that he was not ready for a four-year university.

Two years later, he has been accepted into the aerospace engineering program at Virginia Tech. He also has applied to the University of Virginia School of Engineering and is awaiting a response.

His choice to come to PVCC has been a good one. Mr. Gstattenbauer has praise for his professors who couple knowledge of their subjects with a personal concern for all their students. As a result of his classroom experience at PVCC, he will enter the four-year environment with a strong foundation in mathematics and science.

Mr. Gstattenbauer has been involved in activities beyond the classroom at PVCC. He is a Student Ambassador, volunteering for tasks in the Division of Student Services and serving as a representative for the college. In January, he was part of the PVCC delegation that traveled to Richmond for Community College Day. This annual event brings community college representatives from around the state to the General Assembly to meet with their senators and delegates.

The son of Werner and Pam Gstattenbauer of Crozet, he is an Eagle Scout in Troop 79. His most recent community service has been at the University of Virginia Medical Center where he delivered flowers and mail to patients this spring.

Mr. Gstattenbauer's long-term plans will take him far from Central Virginia—he hopes to become an astronaut.

DISTINGUISHED STUDENT AWARD

ERIN HUGHEY-COMMERS

Centennial Scholar, Commonwealth of Virginia

Erin Hughey-Commers is a scholar and a student leader. Her achievements were celebrated in April when she was recognized as Virginia's 2001 Centennial Scholar at the American Association of Community Colleges national convention in Chicago. The scholars program was created to mark the 100th anniversary of the two-year college system in this country.

Ms. Hughey-Commers was PVCC's entry into the annual All-USA Academic Team competition conducted by Phi Theta Kappa, the honor society of two-year colleges, and supported by *USA Today*. She was named Centennial Scholar for Virginia because she ranked highest in the state in scoring based on academic and leadership achievements. Her scoring placed her on the All-USA Academic Third Team and she was listed in the April 5 issue of *USA Today*. As a Centennial Scholar, she also received a \$2,000 stipend from the Coca-Cola Scholarship Foundation.

The daughter of Patrick and Tina Hughey-Commers of Lovingson, she came to PVCC in the fall of 1998. PVCC was her first formal educational setting; she previously had been home schooled.

One of her most significant experiences at PVCC was her year-long internship with English Professor Dick Harrington. Through the internship she learned how the college works as she attended faculty meetings and participated in college committees. She learned about the teaching profession as she traveled to several conferences for presentations with Dr. Harrington. She also assisted him in the classroom.

As Ms. Hughey-Commers began to realize "what an exceptional experience I've had here," she set out this spring to "give something back." She surveyed her peers and then scheduled two round-tables—one on how students would change their experience if they could and another on the nature of teaching and learning. She hopes these events will lead to an ongoing forum that will challenge students and faculty to think about "how we can become better."

Ms. Hughey-Commers has concluded her study at PVCC. She will enroll this fall at St. John's College in Maryland.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

DAVID V. STRIDER, JR.

*Associate in Applied Science, Nursing
Summa cum laude, Class of 1983*

David Strider is honored today as the recipient of the 2001 Distinguished Alumni Award. Established by the PVCC Alumni Association in 1998, the award recognizes personal or professional accomplishments of PVCC alumni. It was created to call public attention to the significant roles PVCC alumni are playing in Central Virginia communities and beyond.

Mr. Strider is manager for the Thoracic Cardiovascular Surgery Service In-Patient Units within the Heart Center at the University of Virginia Medical Center, a position he has held since 1998. As manager, he hires, evaluates, and provides ongoing professional development opportunities for more than 120 health care providers, including registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, nursing aides, and clerical aides. He also lectures, participates in conferences, teaches an advanced cardiac life support class several times a year, and conducts research. He has served on numerous Medical Center committees and work groups and has been guest editor for *HeartBeat* newsletter.

Mr. Strider earned a bachelor's degree from the College of William and Mary and a master's degree in biology from UVa before entering the nursing program at PVCC. Six years after graduating from PVCC with a perfect 4.0 grade point average, he received a bachelor of science degree in nursing from UVa. In 1991, he earned a master's degree in nursing, also from UVa. Most recently, he completed the acute care nurse practitioner program at the university.

Except for several years as a part-time nurse for Culpeper Memorial Hospital, Mr. Strider has been employed at the UVa Medical Center. His clinical expertise was acknowledged in 1995 when he received the prestigious Nancy Hilt Award given by the local chapter of the international nursing honor society, Sigma Theta Tau.

Mr. Strider is involved in the Charlottesville community as a member of Westminster Presbyterian Church, as an organizer and official for several swim teams, and as a participant in the Greenbrier Neighborhood Association.

MARY BALDWIN COLLEGE 2000-2001 GRADUATES

THE ACADEMIC REGALIA

The history of academic dress reaches back to medieval universities, where the gown, the cap, and the hood signified the privileges and responsibilities of the scholar. The teaching guild was the guild of the master of arts; the bachelor was the apprentice of the master.

At Cambridge and Oxford universities, every detail of academic dress is subject to regulation by the university. At one time, Oxford tailors who did not comply with the rules could be punished by the vice chancellor of the university. European universities continue to show great diversity in academic dress. American colleges and universities, however, have followed a single standard of academic dress since 1895.

The gown has become a symbol of the democracy of scholarship as it covers dress indicating rank or social standing. Bachelor's and master's degree gowns have no trimming; the doctor's degree gown is faced with velvet and has velvet bars on the sleeves in colors to show the faculty or discipline to which the degree pertains.

The cap symbolizes freedom of scholarship. The symbol derives from Roman times when freed slaves had the privilege of wearing a cap. Academic caps feature a tassel indicating the discipline of the wearer.

The hood is the forerunner to the present cap. Its colors denote the discipline represented by the degree, and the college or university from which the degree was granted.

THE CEREMONIAL MACE

The Piedmont Virginia Community College mace was presented to the college by University of Virginia President Robert M. O'Neil in 1988. The gift honored PVCC President George B. Vaughan as he prepared to leave the college and also signified the close working relationship that had developed between the two institutions.

The mace is a traditional ceremonial staff which serves as a symbol of authority. The PVCC mace is made of silver and walnut and incorporates a Jefferson cup into its design. It was created by John J. Owen, retired vice president for development at the University of Virginia.
